Primary and Secondary Road Fund


- Over \$3 Billion of needed transportation improvements on our region's Primary and Secondary Roads
- Current Hampton Roads Transportation Fund includes a regional sales tax the equivalent of 7/10 of a penny
- Increasing the regional sales tax to a full penny would generate approximately \$84 Million per year that could be financed through HRTAC to address unfunded needs

Impacts on our Residents


- \$ 48 per year per person





Thank You Hampton Roads Caucus

- HB 2466 – Passed House and Senate
- Vetoed by Governor
- HRTPO requests that the Hampton Roads Caucus resubmit a similar Bill this year

Funding for Flood Prevention

- Continue to provide State funding to support the Community Flood Preparedness Fund (Minimum of \$ 200 Million)
- Develop a State funding program to provide the non-federal match for federal grants to support large-scale flood relief projects

Budget Amendment Submitted in both Senate and House



Inflation-Adjusted




Request

- Coordinated statewide effort with all 21 PDCs

Trail Funding

Virginia Capital Trail

- 52-mile trail extending from downtown Richmond to James City County.
- Trail planning started in the late 90s, with trail construction ending in 2015.
- Over 1 million users on the trail in 2020.

Regional Trails Accessible from Trail757:

— Existing - - - Planned

- South Hampton Roads Trail**
(Suffolk Seaboard Coastline Trail, Western Branch Chesapeake Trail, Portsmouth Rail-to-Trail, section of the Elizabeth River Trail, and the Virginia Beach Trail)
- Chesapeake Bay Southside Loop**
- Dismal Swamp Canal Trail**
- East Coast Greenway**
- Elizabeth River Trail**
- Virginia Beach Boardwalk**
- Virginia Capital Trail**



Funding Needs – Approximately \$400 M

- **Trail 757: \$240-\$300 million**
 - Approx. 60 miles remaining, \$240 - \$300 million
- **Dismal Swamp Trail: \$3 million**
 - Total 5 miles of trail to complete the gap between the Virginia and North Carolina sections.
 - Approx. 1.8 miles remain on the Virginia side of the trail; TPO staff estimate around \$3 million.
- **VB Trail: \$55 million**
 - Funding is needed for the design and construction of 7 miles;
- **ERT: \$47- \$53 million**
 - Approx 7 – 10 miles planned east extension (pending route selection)
 - TPO staff estimate: Around \$47 - \$53 million
- **Other: \$25 million**
 - TPO staff estimate approximately \$25 million to complete sections of the SHRT in Chesapeake and Portsmouth

Emergency Management (recommendations from AHAC)

- Increase Regional Sheltering/Mass Care Capabilities
- Improve Shelter Staffing
- Create a Statewide Shelter Registration System
- Strengthen Emergency Management
- Enhance VDEM Financial Independence

Currently, only 20% of VDEM's budget is supported with State dollars – 80 % is provided by Federal grant monies

Energy Supply

- Support State policies that provide for a comprehensive approach to energy supply development
 - Offshore Wind
 - Natural Gas
 - SMRs

Other Potential Legislative Items

- Support Faster and More Reliable Passenger Rail Service between Hampton Roads, Richmond and the Northeast Corridor
- Adequate Funding for Hampton Roads' Three Transit Providers
- Continue Efforts to Mitigate Toll Impacts at Downtown and Midtown Tunnels
- Provide adequate funding for transportation network maintenance and repair
- Funding to support economic development site preparation
